- create a toy by cutting out material; joining material using a needle and thread; and adding stuffing.












<u>History — The Tudors</u>


Children will be learning -

Each week, a current news story is chosen and presented in a child-friendly way. As part of the assemblies, an image and




thought-provoking question are shown to children linked to the topic. Children will then have the opportunity to discuss and debate answers to the given weekly questions.


Class Reads

'The Sleeper and the Spindle' by Neil Gaiman and 'Sir Gawain and the Green Knight' by Michael Morpurgo.

English

The main book used in Year Five for this half-term will be 'The Sleeper and the Spindle' by Neil Gaiman. Throughout this book, children will explore and discuss fairy tales and how this fairy tale subverts the genre. In Grammar lessons, children will practise using relative clauses, the use of brackets to punctuate additional information and expanded noun phrases. They will apply this in their writing when working towards creating their own fairy tale prequel/sequel. To improve our pieces of work, they will spend time editing, focusing on spelling, punctuation and grammar. We will also continue to practise using neat, joined handwriting as this is a requirement for all children at the end of Key Stage Two.





To develop their Reading skills this half-term, children will be studying the novel 'Sir Gawain and the Green Knight' which was written by Michael Morpurgo. Of all the tales of the Knights of the Round Table, the story of Sir Gawain and the Green Knight is one of the most magical. Children will experience thrills and enchantment, chivalry and courage, a challenge and a quest. Its hero is the greatest of all King Arthur's knights, Sir Gawain. His adversary is the fearsome Green Knight, who rides into Camelot one New Year's Eve with a challenge that strikes dread into Arthur's court. For Gawain, it is the start of an extraordinary adventure. During Reading lessons, children will explore the common traits of traditional stories and investigate

new vocabulary that they encounter when reading. They will develop their retrieval and inference skills, particularly focusing on the impressions that they have of characters and justifying them with evidence.

We would ask that children in Year 5 aim to read for twenty minutes a day at home. All children in Year 5 will have a book to read at home from our school reading scheme and a library book of their choice.

Mathematics

Children will be learning to -

- identify multiples and factors, including finding all factor pairs of a number, and common factors of two numbers.
- use the vocabulary of prime numbers, prime factors and composite (non-prime) numbers.
- solve problems involving addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.
- multiply and divide numbers mentally, using known facts.
- multiply numbers up to 4 digits by a two-digit whole number using the formal written method of long multiplication.
- divide numbers up to 4 digits by a two-digit whole number using the formal written method of long division, and interpret remainders as whole number remainders and fractions.
- compare and order fractions.
- identify equivalent fractions.

Science - Living things and their habitats

Children will be learning -

- to classify living things using observable characteristics.
- to give reasons for these classifications.
- about Carl Linnaeus and how to use the Linnaeus' system to classify living things.
- to create their own classification system and key.
- to research unfamiliar living things and place them in the classification system.
- to explain and investigate micro-organisms.
